On March 22, over 100 *griefHaven* families, friends, and specialists gathered in a private screening room in Beverly Hills, California for a free *griefHaven* event that included a private screening of the movie *The Greatest* followed by a Q&A with Shana Feste, director and writer, Beau St. Clair, producer, and Wayne Neiman, *griefHaven* advisory board member and executive at Warner Bros. And the weekend prior to the *griefHaven* private screening, Susan Whitmore, our founder and president, met with Shana Feste and her husband, Brian Kavanaugh Jones, for a no-holds-barred interview regarding every-

Quotes About The Greatest

"I didn't want to see the movie because it was a school night and I had a lot of homework. Plus, I thought 'why would I want to see a movie that is my life?' Now I am so glad that I did.

My brother died two years ago in a car accident, and I had also heard there was a car accident in the movie which I was afraid to see. All I can say is that I am so glad I did see this movie. Everything in it was accurate, and I kept hoping that anyone whose brother or sister has died would see the movie because it will give them so much hope. I also kept hoping my parents and grandparents who were there with us would see what it's like for me, because the brother in the movie had it exactly right. Thanks to griefHaven for putting this event on, and I do recommend it to siblings (of the right age) and their friends and relatives." Sibling

The evening was 'right,' although the circumstances that brought us all there were wrong. I'm glad I came. I'm glad my [surviving] son was with me.

The movie was great! The acting was brilliant...each and every actor gave an honest performance and reached emotional depths beyond expectations. Susan Sarandon was 'raw' and kept a steady pace of painful anxiety throughout the entire movie. Pierce Brosnan demonstrated a gritty despair of emotionality that penetrated every turn the story took. Johnny Simmons was simply and brilliantly believable as their grieving son. And Carrie Mulligan...wow! A performance of certainty and truth. Every expression she portrayed stepped gently into the character letting the audience know that Rose's strength and determination was unwavering.

Shana Feste wrote and directed a story that needs to be

told...a story that needs to be seen...and a story that is about real-life drama. I commend her sensitivity and intelligence, as the movie reflected these qualities. Her senses were alert, as the film took you on a journey of pure realism and thought. The *Greatest* is a great movie!" Parent

"Grief comes cloaked in as many forms as the tragedies that cause it. Almost all of them are on view in *The Greatest*, a somber, sensitively acted, intelligently penned, and sincerely directed film about the untimely death of a much-admired young man, the profound impact it has on his family, and the various ways the people who love him learn to express their mourning. The usual grumpy cynics will undoubtedly call it sentimental and manipulative. Ignore them. *The Greatest* is cut from the same bolt of emotional genre fabric as the 1980 classic, *Ordinary People*--a rare bird among films because it is strong and filled with extraordinary human values that remain foreign to most hermetically sealed studio packages. The title refers to the boy who departs too soon, not to the movie itself, which may also depart too soon depending on box-office grosses, but not because it's undeserving.

A debut effort carefully written and directed by Shana Feste, [*The Greatest*] offers a nuanced diagnosis of people in both their goodness and imperfection, with a touching screenplay that focuses on the actual things people do and say in survival mode. This is not the kind of personal movie Hollywood knows how to make very often, and God knows it is not the kind of movie Hollywood *ever* knows how to sell. (Already they're asking, "Does it have legs?") It's not *Avatar*, but in an equitable movie world, there should be something for everyone.

One caveat: If it's true, as they say, that when one door closes, another door opens, I feel that perhaps in *The Greatest* too many doors open too fast in time to meet the deadline for a happy ending, but this is just a small hangnail compared to the manicured strengths of a film of maturity and courage that kept me consistently engaged. Quite an accomplishment, really, for a new filmmaker on her first date with a camera."

"I have spent the last eight years since the death of my child avoiding watching any movie that includes someone's child dying. THAT pattern was broken when I saw *The Greatest* at the private *griefHaven* screening, and boy oh boy am I glad that I did. This film, *The Greatest*, has truly given me such validation and hope that we parents will perhaps receive more understanding and support from those who have seen this movie, because this writer/director finally got it right! FINALLY someone got it right. Every second in this movie paints a picture of what a day in the life is like for a family

who is picking up the pieces and living life after a child and sibling dies. But it's not just some gut-wrenchingly sad movie. Not at all. It's beautifully written, acted, and full of meaning and hope. There are moments of laughter and genuine caring and loving. The surprise story (I don't want to spoil it for anyone) is based on a true story that really happened to someone, and Shana said she decided to include it. Nothing is far out in this movie. It's as if Shana Feste said to us, 'Come with me, and I will give you a special gift of hope that will help you and those you love for the rest of your lives.' You, as the audience, are drawn in and find yourselves saying, 'Yes, that is exactly how it is! Yes! That is what it's like.' You'll find yourselves wanting everyone to see this movie so they, too, will get it. And no one will be upset with you because you took them to see this movie. In fact, they will thank you—yes they will. My hope is that everyone who has lost a child, lost a brother or sister, been impacted by the death of someone's child (family member or friend) or who works in the various fields where children die will see this movie. Tell everyone you know to go and see it! Trust me on this one." Father
